	<p>Page Title for Storyline Menu: Websites for Grants</p> <p>Grants.gov is an especially good website to get to know. It's the single access point for over 900 federal grant programs. Not only that, but most agencies require their grant applications be submitted electronically through the grants.gov portal instead of through the individual agency.</p>	
	<p>Page Title for Storyline Menu: CFDA</p> <p>Natalie</p> <p>Hi, my name is Natalie Field. I'm a government Project Officer. My advice is to look at the Catalogue for Federal Domestic Assistance. Ask them about their funding cycles because it's important to keep track of when their Requests for Applications, or RFAs, or Funding Opportunity Announcements, or FOAs, will hit the street.
